GENERAL CONTRACT FOR SERVICES

This Contract for Services ("Contract") is made effective as of May 17th, 2023, by and between Georgetown Fire Protection District, CA ("District") of 6283 Main St. Georgetown, CA 95634 and GovInvest Inc. ("GovInvest") of 8605 Santa Monica Blvd., PMB 52465, West Hollywood, CA 90069.

1. DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES. Beginning on May 17th, 2023, GovInvest will provide to DISTRICT the following services (collectively, the "Services"):

- Annual GASB 75 Valuation Reports.
- Annual Pension and OPEB Updates/Support.

2. PAYMENT. Payment shall be made to GovInvest of 8605 Santa Monica Blvd., PMB 52465, West Hollywood, CA 90069.

DISTRICT agrees to pay for the services as follows:

Service Fee: \$2,500.

DISTRICT shall pay all costs of collection, including without limitation, reasonable attorney fees. In addition to any other right or remedy provided by law, if DISTRICT fails to pay for the Services when due, GovInvest has the option to treat such failure to pay as a material breach of this Contract, and may cancel this Contract and/or seek legal remedies.

3. TERM. This Contract will remain in effect for a period of 1 year.

4. WORK PRODUCT OWNERSHIP. Any copyrightable works, ideas, discoveries, inventions, patents, products, or other information (collectively the "Work Product") developed in whole or in part by GovInvest in connection with the Services will be the exclusive property of GovInvest. Upon request, DISTRICT will execute all documents necessary to confirm or perfect the exclusive ownership of GovInvest to the Work Product.

5. WARRANTY. GovInvest shall provide its services and meet its obligations under this Contract in a workmanlike manner, using knowledge and recommendations for performing the services which meet generally acceptable standards in GovInvest's community and region.

6. DEFAULT. The occurrence of any of the following shall constitute a material default under this Contract:

The failure to make a required payment when due.

The insolvency or bankruptcy of either party.

The subjection of any of either party's property to any levy, seizure, general assignment for the benefit of creditors, application or sale for or by any creditor or government agency.

7. REMEDIES. In addition to any and all other rights a party may have available according to law, if a party defaults by failing to substantially perform any provision, term or condition of this Contract (including without limitation the failure to make a monetary payment when due), the other party may terminate the Contract by providing written notice to the defaulting party. This notice shall describe with sufficient detail the nature of the default. The party receiving such notice shall have ten days from the effective date of such

notice to cure the default(s). Unless waived in writing by the party providing notice, the failure to cure the default(s) within such time period shall result in the automatic termination of this Contract.

8. FORCE MAJEURE. If performance of this Contract or any obligation under this Contract is prevented, restricted, or interfered with by causes beyond either party's reasonable control ("Force Majeure"), and if the party unable to carry out its obligations gives the other party prompt written notice of such event, then the obligations of the party invoking this provision shall be suspended to the extent necessary by such event. The term Force Majeure shall include, without limitation, acts of God, fire, explosion, vandalism, storm or other similar occurrence, orders or acts of military or civil authority, or by national emergencies, insurrections, riots, or wars, or strikes, lock-outs, work stoppages. The excused party shall use reasonable efforts under the circumstances to avoid or remove such causes of non-performance and shall proceed to perform with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed or ceased. An act or omission shall be deemed within the reasonable control of a party if committed, omitted, or caused by such party, or its employees, officers, agents or affiliates.

9. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Contract contains the entire agreement of the parties, and there are no other promises or conditions in any other agreement whether oral or written concerning the subject matter of this Contract. This Contract supersedes any prior written or oral agreements between the parties.

10. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Contract is held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions will continue to be valid and enforceable. If a court finds that any provision of this Contract is invalid or unenforceable, but that by limiting such provision it would become valid and enforceable, then such provision will be deemed to be written, construed, and enforced as so limited.

11. AMENDMENT. This Contract may be modified or amended in writing by mutual agreement between the parties, if the writing is signed by both parties.

12. GOVERNING LAW. This Contract shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California and adjudicated exclusively in the State of California.

13. NOTICE. Any notice or communication required or permitted under this Contract shall be sufficiently given if delivered in person or by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the address set forth in the opening paragraph or to such other address as one party may have furnished to the other in writing.

14. WAIVER OF CONTRACTUAL RIGHT. The failure of either party to enforce any provision of this Contract shall not be construed as a waiver or limitation of that party's right to subsequently enforce and compel strict compliance with every provision of this Contract.

15. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY. GOVINVEST IS A PASSIVE CONDUIT THAT CONNECTS DISTRICT WITH SUBCONTRACTORS WHO PERFORM THE SERVICES AND PROVIDE THE WORK PRODUCT HEREIN. ACCORDINGLY, UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES WILL GOVINVEST HAVE ANY LIABILITY FOR THE ACTIONS AND/OR INACTIONS OF SUCH PARTIES. THE SOLE LIABILITY SHALL REST WITH SUCH SUBCONTRACTORS. IN ADDITION, IN NO EVENT SHALL GOVINVEST, BE LIABLE ON ANY THEORY OF LIABILITY, WHETHER IN AN EQUITABLE, LEGAL, OR COMMON LAW ACTION ARISING HEREUNDER FOR CONTRACT, STRICT LIABILITY, TORT (INCLUDING NEGLIGENCE), OR OTHERWISE, FOR DAMAGES WHICH, IN THE AGGREGATE, EXCEED THE AMOUNT OF CHARGES PAID BY DISTRICT FOR THE SERVICES WHICH GAVE RISE TO SUCH DAMAGES AND NOTWITHSTANDING THE FAILURE OF ESSENTIAL PURPOSE OF ANY REMEDY. IN ADDITION, IN NO EVENT SHALL GOVINVEST BE LIABLE FOR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, EXEMPLARY, PUNITIVE, OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES OF ANY KIND AND HOWEVER CAUSED,

INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO BUSINESS INTERRUPTION OR LOSS OF PROFITS, BUSINESS OPPORTUNITIES, OR GOOD WILL EVEN IF NOTIFIED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGE, AND NOTWITHSTANDING THE FAILURE OF ESSENTIAL PURPOSE OF ANY REMEDY.

16. CONSTRUCTION AND INTERPRETATION. The rule requiring construction or interpretation against the drafter is waived. The document shall be deemed as if it were drafted by both parties in a mutual effort.

17. ASSIGNMENT. Neither party may assign or transfer this Contract without the prior written consent of the non-assigning party, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Snoke, Staves receive EMS honors

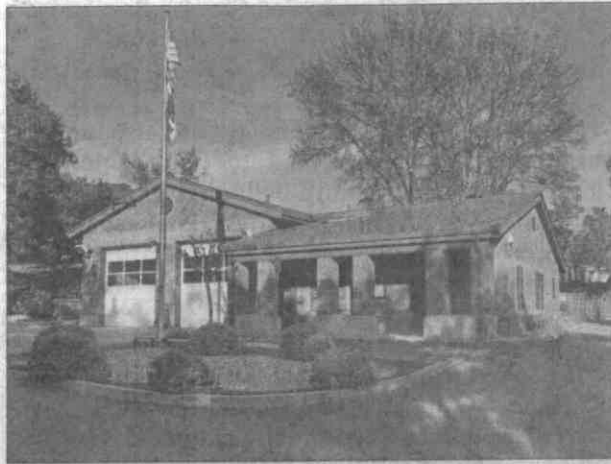

Station 88's future still in limbo

“What does the public want?”

Cameron Park Community Services District Director Dawn Wolfson posed this question last Wednesday night to dozens in the audience and others listening online as the board grappled with a difficult decision regarding fire service in the community.

The resounding answer: keep Fire Station 88 open.

After three hours of discussion, debate and more than a few heated words, the CPCSD Board of Directors decided to table adoption of a Cal Fire contract extension and schedule a special meeting to further hash out the issue. A decision on fire service must be made before the current Cal Fire contract expires June 30.

The resolution brought to the board May 17

includes a five-year service extension agreement with Cal Fire — July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2028 — during which time Cal Fire would operate out of Station 89 on Country Club Drive using a nine-person staffing model (one three-person engine company with a staffing factor of three — three crew members per seat working three-day/72 hour shifts) and keep ambulance service in the district. The board did vote 4-0 to approve the contract for ambulance service as a separate matter. Director Monique Scobey was absent.

The agreement also calls for the browning out of Station 88 on Alhambra Drive, though it's noted in CPCSD General Manager André Pichly's report that grant funding could temporarily reopen the station if applications in process are successful.

The three-person per engine staffing model has become the industry standard and ideal to adequately respond to emergencies, fire officials at the meeting agreed. Director Eric Aiston noted that each firefighter cost approximately \$250,000 per year, covering salary, benefits, etc. The district doesn't have enough money to add additional staff beyond what's in the proposed contract as, even with the cost savings included by utilizing the nine-person staffing model, the CPCSD faces an anticipated budget gap of more than \$275,000 between the fire services' projected revenues and expenditures in fiscal year 2023-24. That deficit grows wider through the life of the five-year contract extension.

But residents demanded and pleaded — find the money.

"I want safety over recreation," Tina Shaw said, sharing that she had a house fire a few years ago and was grateful for the three engines that showed up to douse the flames.

"We need to look at different ways to keep this fire station open," District 2 Supervisor George Turnboo told the board. "If that means tightening your belt, tighten your belt. Public safety is your No. 1 priority."

"Losing an engine company will cost lives," stressed Paul Gilcrest, who serves on the El Dorado County Fire Protection District Board of Directors and launched in 2016 the Greater Cameron Park Area Fire Safe Council.

Speakers also noted the impacts Station 88's closure would have on other fire districts.

EDC Auditor-Controller Joe Harn, a Cameron Park resident, admonished the board for not reaching out sooner to neighboring departments, saying, "They need time to plan."

"Removing one engine will impact the entire fire system on the West Slope," El Dorado Hills Fire Chief Maurice Johnson said. He stressed the departments will "step up" when called upon but it will be a challenge for everyone.

"We do not care about the boundaries; we're there for our people," El Dorado County Fire Protection District Fire Chief Tim Cordero said, adding the advice that the Cameron Park board needs to listen to its residents.

In a letter shared with the Mountain Democrat, president of the Rescue Professional Firefighters Association Brett Jones noted the Western Slope Cooperative Fire Services Mutual Aid Agreement was created to ensure a closest resource dispatching model for fire, rescue or medical calls but is "not a giveaway program."

"By fire districts continuing to close stations and relying on smaller agencies like Rescue to handle emergencies for which they are not compensated, the larger agencies are in violation of the mutual aid agreement," he wrote.

Rescue Fire Department board member Matt Koht, who spoke at the May 17 meeting, echoed those sentiments and added that Station 88's closure "will break the rest of the departments around you."

Several speakers also pointed out that browning out Station 88 would negatively impact residents' ability to get and/or afford fire insurance on Cameron Park's north side.

CPCSD directors and Cal Fire staff stressed browning out the fire station is not an action anyone wants to take but members of the public urged them to take a close look at the numbers and CSD budget before making a final decision. Pichly is expected to bring back hard numbers related to other CSD expenditures and revenue during the as-of-yet unscheduled special meeting.

Firewise USA discounts to be state-mandated

California Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara announced May 6 that by the end of the year all insurance companies will be mandated to offer a discount to insured members who create defensible space and adhere to guidelines outlined by Firewise USA, a program that encourages wildfire risk mitigation.

Lara, State Sen. Marie Alvarado-Gil, South Lake Tahoe Fire Rescue Chief Jim Drennan, SLTFR Marshall Kim George and Al Tahoe Firewise community leader Dianne Rees presented a united front in a round table discussion format while captivating an audience of more than 100 people. While the event was cut short due to conflicting schedules, a lot of information was covered regarding home hardening, defensible space and new regulations regarding insurance carrier responsibilities.

South Lake Tahoe City Manager Joe Irvin, Mayor Christi Creegan, Mayor Pro Tem Cody Bass and City Council member Scott Robbins were in attendance

amongst community members at large who “started the conversation,” according to Rees, the event’s lead organizer.

The irony of the snow falling on Saturday, National Wildfire Preparedness Day, was not lost on Lara, who said while it’s snowing one day the region could very well see wildfire the next.

“The new insurance pricing and transparency regulation came from the feedback I received since being elected in 2019 from the counties suffering from wildfire,” Lara said, adding that the new regulations will help to ensure discounts for those already doing wildfire mitigation, transparency on wildfire risk scores as well as provide homeowners an opportunity to appeal scores.

Lara’s regulation is the first in the nation requiring insurance companies to provide discounts to consumers under the Safer from Wildfires framework created by the California Department of Insurance in partnership with state emergency preparedness agencies, according to the CDI website.

During a question and answer period,

Lara responded to questions from the community, one of which focused assertions that the California FAIR Plan is not so fair after all.

The intention of the FAIR Plan considered, “California’s insurance safety net” by the CDI is to provide equal access to basic fire insurance when access to coverage in the traditional market is not available through no fault of the property owner, according to the website.

The plan was the topic of an investigatory hearing that Lara presided over. The goal of the hearing was to hear from the public to inform the future of the FAIR Plan to better meet the needs of California consumers.

“Insurance until now hasn’t really helped you prepare and now we’re requiring insurance companies to do their part,” said deputy insurance commissioner Michael Soller.

“What went unmentioned during the nearly two-hour event is that every house sold within the high severity zone can’t go into escrow without a property inspection — that is huge,” Rees said, adding that the new regulations will have a ripple effect.

Georgetown Fire Chief Glenn Brown told the Gazette the cause of the fire is under investigation and the garage was a total loss.

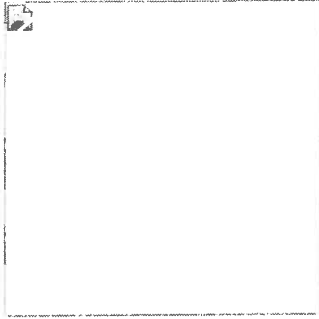
Bid on surplus items
